And on Saturday November 18, the Foxlowe will play host to An Evening with Gervas Phinn who tells hilarious stories of his life as a teacher and school inspector. Gervase has published five volumes of memoir, collections of poetry and a number of books about education. He has a particular interest in children's literature and literacy. 'Volunteering at the Foxlowe is amazing'



Volunteers are the backbone of the Foxlowe Arts Centre – every single person who gives any amount of their free time to help keep the community venture going is valued and we, the trustees of the centre, can not thank each and every one of them enough.

And it is for this reason that we are introducing a 'Volunteer Profile' to the ST13 news-letter – to help celebrate and recognise all that our wonderful volunteers do.

And who better to focus on initially than someone who spends hours upon hours at the Foxlowe helping to maintain and nuture the beautiful gardens and also spends hours in her other role as the venue's website administrator.

Alison McCrea, pictured above has been volunteering at the Foxlowe Arts Centre since it opened in 2011. The mum-of-three and grandmother-of-two, along with her husband Nigel, co-ordinates the maintenance and nuturing of the Foxlowe Garden.

She said: "We first got involved with the Foxlowe after hearing of the plea for pledgers to help turn the venue into an arts centre and then we started helping in the garden as we both enjoy gardening.

"Back then, there was just mown grass areas and the car park, but nothing else at the back of the Foxlowe."

Since then, retired environmental scientist Alison has spent many hours, with the help of fellow volunteers, in making the gardens what they are today. There is a beautiful willow fence, a wild flower area with a Staffordshire Knot mown through it, a Bee Hotel, a quirky archway with plants growing up it, and a wooden spider for youngsters to clamber on. Plus there is a variety of fruit and vegetables growing in the garden that are available for people to enjoy, and some are also used in the Foxlowe's kitchen.

Alison, aged 68, said: "I am pleased with the fruits of our labour. It is great that we produce food but the primary purpose is to make the garden look nice and for it to be structured for children to play in."

As well as lovingly maintaining the garden, Alison also co-ordinates green-fingered focused activities and events such as a Seed Swap Day and Plant Share initiatives.

Originally from Northern Ireland, Alison moved to Leek ten years ago. She said of why she volunteers at the Foxlowe: "Because I like it. The great thing about volunteering is that you don't have to do it. If you don't like it, then don't do it. Obviously you do need to have a little bit of commitment once you have said you will do something, but you can generally pick and choose when you volunteer.

"I find volunteering is very rewarding, especially at the Foxlowe. What I love about the Foxlowe is that there is such a diversity in both the activities on offer and also the people who volunteer here.

"Everyone is so committed to this wonderful institution. It is a wonderful place to meet people who share your commitment and passion – people from all different backgrounds and experiences who you would perhaps not normally get to know in the world of work or social scene. It is not a private club, everyone who wants to, can get involved. It's amazing." Alison added: "We have a great team of volunteers helping to keep the Foxlowe Garden as it is. Some have taken responsibility for certain aspects such as the planters on the patio, the
